In Text

Basic Formula

When you quote or paraphrase someone, use the name of the author and/or the title of the work in your sentence, and put the number of the page where your quotation appears in parentheses at the end of your sentence.

Example

In the early pages of her 2002 study of *Repair*, Elizabeth Spelman points to the extensive list of near-synonyms for repair in English, including a “restore, rehabilitate, renovate, reconcile, redeem, heal, fix, and mend” (4).
